✓ Great Ormond Street Hospital (GOSH) opened on **14 February 1852** as The Hospital for Sick Children, the first UK hospital dedicated to children's inpatient care. Founded by Dr. Charles West to address high infant mortality in London, it initially operated from 49 Great Ormond Street with only 10 beds



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✓ Since then, GOSH has grown into a world leader in pediatric healthcare, focusing on complex and rare diseases. Through partnerships and research, GOSH has developed treatments used globally and hosts the UK's only **NIHR Biomedical Research Centre** dedicated to child health, along with a **Clinical Research Facility** for specialized pediatric research

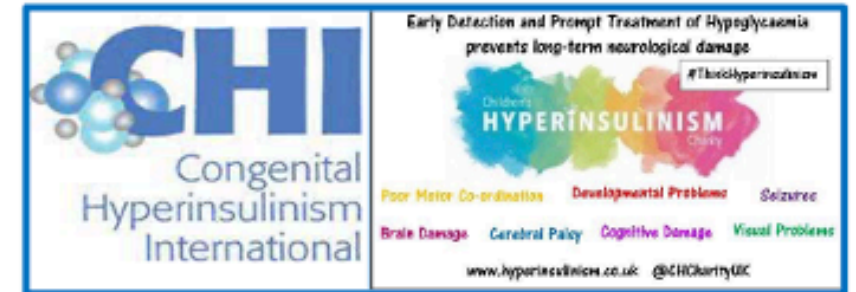
